Enjoy it while it lasts

China's growth was strong in Q1 at 6.7%, and consequently the IMF and others have been revising upwards their 2016 forecasts for the economy. Unfortunately, we see nothing to celebrate in the recent data. The growth was fueled by an explosion of lending; total social financing (TSF) in the quarter was up by a staggering 43% over a year earlier (though admittedly from a relatively low base). Things look slightly better when you look at the growth in the outstanding stock of TSF, which was up "only" 13.4%. But this is still nearly twice nominal GDP (7.2%).

The upshot is that is that China's growth is increasingly unsustainable. Unfortunately, there are no credible plans to deal with the rising debt, and the structural reforms needed to put the economy on a more sustainable path are now secondary to goosing growth.

At a special meeting last week to discuss the economy, Premier Li offered no new thinking. He promised continued fiscal stimulus through a combination of government spending and tax cuts, but proposed no novel policy ideas.

Meanwhile, Xi continues to focus on politics to the exclusion of the economy. Monday's meeting of the Leading Small Group for Comprehensively Deepening Reform passed several documents aimed at limiting family members of officials from engaging in business. It would be much more helpful if Xi would focus on expanding economic activity instead of circumscribing it.

They witnessed the signing of five cooperation deals in areas such as technological innovation, tourism, industrial parks and mining.

Apr 13 Li chaired an executive meeting of the State Council.

The meeting heard an investigation report on illegal sales of problematic vaccines in Jinan, passed an amendment of the Regulations on Management regarding the Circulation of Vaccine and Vaccine's Prevention and Inoculation, and also decided to gradually lower social security and housing fund payments for enterprises.

Li met with Nigerian President Muhammadu Buhari.

Apr 12 Li met with Israeli Parliament Speaker Yuli Edelstein.

Li extended condolences to Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi over the fireworks disaster in Kerala, India.
