Dear friends and colleagues,

Happy lianghui! I am at the airport on the way to Beijing, where I will be for the next week. I will then be in Wuhan the week following and Hong Kong and Singapore the week after that. If there are readers in any of those cities that would like to meet, please get in touch.

I've been running around in preparation for the trip, so have yet to look at the various work reports delivered yesterday, but impressions from the little bit that I have picked up are pretty underwhelming. The most basic contradiction at the heart of China's economic policymaking remains the continuing use of growth targets. Given the current accommodative monetary and fiscal policy stance, I think the 6.5% target for this year is possible (just barely), but trying to maintain that rate of growth over the next five years – as the five-year plan mandates – is impossible.

The government's stability bias will mean that structural reforms will proceed cautiously and haltingly, and that many of the underlying structural problems in the economy will remain unaddressed. This means the continued misallocation of capital in the economy and further buildup of (bad) debt. The day of reckoning is still probably years away, but it is disappointing to see the top leadership failing to adequately address the issue.
