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## All eyes on the 19<sup>th</sup> Party Congress

Personnel appointments are beginning to pick up in the run up to the Party's 19<sup>th</sup> Party Congress to be held in late 2017. In the past two weeks, two provincial party secretaries and two provincial governors have been replaced. Of particular note is Hu Heping, who was appointed Acting Governor of Shaanxi last week. Hu has every appearance of being a Xi man. He worked with Xi's roommate, and current deputy head of the Organization Department, Chen Xi at Qinghua University, before being picked to succeed Cai Qi – currently one of Xi's top aides on the National Security Commission – as head of the Organization Department in Zhejiang. Hu is young (54), meaning that he is almost certainly destined for higher office.

## SOE reforms go nowhere

The State Council Leading Group for State-owned Enterprises Reform, chaired by Vice Premier Ma Kai, met on Sunday. The meeting was the latest in a recent spate of relatively high-profile meetings related to SOE reform, including a national teleconference two weeks ago. Both of these come after the State Council identified SOE reform as one of its top 10 areas of focus for the coming year.

Unfortunately, the recent meetings and associated announcements regarding SOE reform give little indication that real progress will be made. "Mixed ownership" remains at the center of reforms, and the government has said that it will encourage private capital to invest in key sectors including power, oil, natural gas, railway, aviation and telecoms.

But mixed ownership has little chance of addressing the fundamental problem with SOEs, namely that their primary motivations are political, not economic. This is because the proposed reforms will not allow private capital to take a controlling share in SOEs; instead, as September 2015's SOE reform made clear, the state must retain the "absolute controlling position" in the companies.
